Getting to research Superior's history has been such a pleasure, and I feel even more connected to my community. I hope these new exhibits at the Old Firehouse & Police Museum






2025: THE YEAR OF THE "FITZ"

2025 marks the 50th anniversary of the tragic sinking of the ship, the SS Edmund Fitzgerald, also known as "the Fitz." Many people don't know that the Edmund Fitzgerald's final journey departed from right here in Superior. To honor those lost that day, including several crew members from the Twin Ports region, the SS Meteor will host a temporary SS Edmund Fitzgerald exhibit this year, created by Museum Manager, Jordan Stish. We will also be supporting the "Friends of the Fitz" group who is raising money to place a historical marker on Barker's Island in memory of the SS Edmund Fitzgerald's crew.

A SNAPSHOT OF THE METEOR'S ROUTES: 1961

SPM Tour Guide Dara Fillmore went through the Meteor's log books to learn more about where the ship went on her many voyages. Dara found a cool story about Trip #58 in 1961:



Trip #58- On July 6, 1961, the *Meteor's* route went from East Chicago, IL, to Green Bay, WI with a cargo of gas and oil. At 12:50 pm, near Green Bay, the crew was given a fire drill, a semi-common safety occurance on board. During the drill, the crew manned their stations while wearing their life belts. The foam system (a fire extinguishing system using foam, similar to thick soap bubbles) was tested during the drill, but no foam was used due to the 'fresh breeze.' By 12:53 pm, the crew was dismissed from the drill, but they weren't quite done with the fun. From 12:53 pm to 12:57 pm, they ran a standby boat drill. The crew gathered near the #7 cargo tank at the aft (back) end of the main deck and instructions were given. Whistles, bells, and phones were all tested before being given the 'all clear.' These events were written into the deck log and signed by the captain, Fred Bollin.

Fred Bollin captained the *Meteor* for a majority of the time between 1946 and 1961, with a few stints captaining some of her astronomically named fleet mates as well, including the *Rocket* and the *Comet* running under the same Cleveland Tankers flag. He spent more time on the *Meteor* between 1965 and her final year of service in 1969.

These logbooks do well in sharing the monotony of short haul trips moving various cargoes and, taking emergency drills in preparation for any potentialities. The captains and crews were dedicated to their work and were detailed in their note taking, and their notes from the log books help us to share their stories today!
